

### Fun Facts About



- Did you know that April is the best month of the year to look up to the skies and watch meteor showers?
- April is known for beautiful spring weather, the start of warmer weather.
- We know it is the fourth month of the year, but that's only by the Gregorian calendar that we adhere to now. It was previously the fifth month in the earlier Julian calendar.
- April also only had 29 days, but a 30<sup>th</sup> day was added when Julius Caesar established the Julian calendar.
- In the Southern Hemisphere, April is the seasonal equivalent of October.
- No one is sure how the month ended up with its name, but we do know the Romans named it "Aprillis."
- The etymology behind the word "April" comes from the verb "aperire," which means "to open." It's commonly believed that the word refers to the season of trees and flowers begin to "open" or bloom.
- Those who were born in April have a diamond as their birthstone, which represents innocence.
   Their birth flower is either a Daisy or a Sweet Pea.
- There are two zodiac signs in April. Aries, which is until <u>April 19<sup>th</sup></u>, and Taurus, which is April 20<sup>th</sup> and onwards.
- April is a great month for meteor showers. One of which is the Lyrids meteor shower, which appears from April 16<sup>th</sup> to April 26<sup>th</sup> each year. There's another one called the Eta Aquariids meteor shower that can be seen onwards from April 21<sup>st</sup>.

- There are quite a few notable historical people born in April, such as Leonardo da Vinci, Shakespeare, and Queen Elizabeth II.
- On April 14, 1912, the famous Titanic ship hit an iceberg and sank on her first and only voyage.
- George Washington was inaugurated as the First President of the United States on <u>April 30</u>, 1789.
- Back in the time of the Ancient Romans, April was sacred to the goddess Venus.
- One of the most well-known dates of the month is April Fools' Day on the 1st of the month. No one is sure where this originated from, but some believe it to be inspired by Geoffrey Chaucer's story in "Canterbury Tales" called "Nun's Priest's Tale."
- On <u>April 11</u>, 1970, Apollo 13 was launched and ran into difficulties about two days later. It was then that the famous line "Houston, we've had a problem here" was said, and is today usually misquoted.
- After a 1,500-year break, the first Olympics of the modern era took place on <u>April 6</u>, 1896, in Athens.
- The explosion of the Chernobyl nuclear plant in Ukraine occurred on <u>April 26</u>, 1986, which forced everyone within a 300-mile radius to be evacuated.
- The smaller animals that hibernate for the winter in the Northern Hemisphere usually start coming out of their burrows in April.
- April is also the month that the birds migrate north and settle down for the summer to mate.
- For all the car enthusiasts out there, Ford unveiled their first Mustang on <u>April 17</u>, 1964, costing \$2,368.
- The first battle of the Revolutionary War, Lexington, and Concord broke out on <u>April 19</u>, 1775.
- Don't forget the Solar Eclipse on April 8.

## Speaking of an Educational Bus Trip

# Five Ways to Prevent Damping Off of Seedlings

Have you ever sown a tray of seeds and watched with excitement as they germinated, only to see the seedlings keel over and die, sometimes overnight? What happened?

It is likely your seedlings succumbed to damping off. Damping off is the umbrella term for several fungal diseases that attach seeds and newly emerged plants. A few simple steps can prevent killing your seedlings.

One of the most important safeguards is keeping everything clean. If you reuse trays, cell packs or pots, wash them, then soak in a 10% bleach solution for at least 30 minutes. Rinse and allow to dry before filling with seed-starting mix. Clean all your tools, watering cans, gloves, and anything else that might harbor fungus.

Don't reuse seed-starting mix from year to year. Commercial seed-starting mix is sterilized to kill any pathogens. If you make your own mix, sterilize the ingredients first.

Avoid sowing too thickly, and don't over fertilize.

Use clean, lukewarm water, at least 68° to 77° F. Be sure the pots used allow for adequate drainage. Water from the bottom, not from overhead, and don't overwater.

Keep humidity from building up. If you cover to keep the mix from drying out, take it off once the first seedlings appear. Use a fan to circulate air. Put seed trays or pots on a heated mat and under a grow light.

For seeds that must be sown outdoors, wait until the garden soil is the right temperature for the type of plant you are growing. The minimum soil temperature for peas, for example, is 40°, but the minimum for cucumbers is 60°F.
