

Tips for Keeping Your Holiday Poinsette Healthy

- Keep your poinsettia in bright light and water it regularly so the soil stays moist but not overly wet – especially if your plant is sitting in a cachepot without drainage holes
- Poinsettias do best in a temperature between 65-75 F. Be careful of chilly drafts if kept near a window.
- As the plant outgrows its container, transplant into a pot just one size larger using fresh potting soil.
- If you want your poinsettia to bloom next Christmas, you'll need to start a regiment of exposing the plant to darkness for 124 hours a day for a total of 40 days for the leaves to take on the red color.

Conditioning Greens

Below is how to condition greens and holly to increase their lifespan when brought indoors.

- Put fresh-cut greens or holly in a bucket of cool water and leave overnight in a cool place, like a garage. The stems will absorb water and last many weeks inside.
- Once soaked, dry the stem ends and dip the ends in melted candle wax, beeswax, or paraffin. This seals the resin, making them last weeks, as opposed to just days, in a warm house.
